Integrated Water Resources Management

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Principles of the 1st Joint Call

Preamble

The funding within the 1st IWRM-NET Call is offered under the coordination of the FP6 IWRM-NET ERA-NET (ERAC-CT-2005-026025), "Towards a European-wide exchange Network for integrating research efforts on Integrated Water Resources Management".

Research participants are required to recognise the coordinating role of IWRM-NET and its general assembly throughout the duration of funded research projects.

IWRM-NET is working on research programmes related to Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM), Water Framework Directive (WFD) and the complementary Groundwater Directive setting out a framework for community action in the field of water policy as a means of implementing Integrated Water Resources Management across Europe. IWRM-NET will identify both short term and long term research needs through a bottom-up approach through its network of 18 partners from 14 countries who have agreed a shared vision for what IWRM-NET should offer by 2010:

- A privileged source of knowledge for IWRM research in Europe, especially as it relates to the WFD.
- A forum for the future development and coordination of research needs and a communications link between researchers, policy-makers and managers.
- A body that can bring together researchers and funders from different countries so that they can work on joint research activities.
- A place to exchange best practice.

By improving the knowledge transfer amongst stakeholders in charge of IWRM, the IWRM network enables partners to work on synergies between research needs and policy and promotes interdisciplinary activities concerning IWRM across Europe. The information created by IWRM-NET funded research will be expected to be disseminated across the network to the appropriate audience, in this instance the river basin managers, in the most effective way possible.

1. Aims of the Call

With reference to the opening statements IWRM-Net would like to invite research that brings together scientific and management disciplines to deliver new approaches to the principles of sustainable development and applies them to water management. The research period will be for approximately 24 months between 2008 and 2010. The focus for this first call is on applied research that will support the development of the 2015 river basin plans.

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IWRM-NET would like to develop a series of case studies within the field testing and application that can be used by relevant river basin managers across Europe and the research would need to consider this in their outputs. Within this requirement there is also a need to consider longer term issues such as climate change to start building links to long-term research and knowledge management processes (e.g. foresight and horizon scanning).

General Principles for research

- A comparison across IWRM-NET countries, looking at sites, methods and processes to develop science based guidelines and identify good practice in achieving Integrated Water Resources Management outcomes, the long-term aim being to develop a common framework for Integrated Water Resources Management with multiple tools that can be applied at the local level.
- Involvement of the practitioners of water resources management in the research projects and transfer of knowledge to the relevant groups so that the information quickly becomes knowledge.

2. Research themes

IWRM-NET has developed the following two topic areas for its first Joint Call;

- Hydrological and morphological pressures and its impacts on ecological status
- Water Governance

2.1 Hydrological and morphological pressures and impacts on ecological status

Both the Water Framework Directive and the Groundwater Directive require water managers to have a sound knowledge of the interaction between physico-chemistry, morphology, hydrology and water-related ecology. This knowledge is vital to understand the key pressure-response relationships that affect the achievement of good ecological status and high water quality in river basins.

In particular there are requirements to describe the quantity and dynamics of water flow, level and residence time and the resultant connection to groundwaters that reflect totally or nearly totally undisturbed conditions. The boundary between the undisturbed conditions and those required to achieve (the specified values for biological quality elements at) the good status level rather than the 'high' undisturbed level must have a clear definition also.

For morphological conditions the principles are the same, in that the channel patterns, width and depth variations, flow velocities, substrate conditions and structure and condition of the riparian/shore zones that reflect totally or nearly totally to undisturbed conditions need to be described and then the boundary with this 'high' status and good needs to link these conditions with the biological quality elements.

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IWRM-NET is aware that there needs to be an improvement in understanding of how changes to the biological quality elements occur following hydrological and morphological pressures on water bodies. Some of these issues will be undertaken in the inter-calibration process and by other FP6/FP7 projects and these will need to be considered in any bids proposed.

Flow regimes and their impact on ecology also need to be understood at the extreme ends of the 'flow envelope', such as droughts and floods. *(Any projects would be expected to consider other work e.g. CRUE ERA-Net which is looking at flood risk management)* This also includes conditions within water bodies that have a non-permanent flow regime.

An important aspect of any part of assessing pressures and impacts on ecological status is the monitoring, which includes surveillance, operational and investigative methods. Analysis of the information from monitoring will have a certain element of uncertainty and there is a need to improve both the monitoring methods and to manage and minimise the uncertainty.

The final aspect for consideration is the long term implications that climate change may have upon the relationships identified. IWRM-NET would like researchers to consider how the work they are undertaking would help in planning or adapting to potential climate changes.

Research bids are invited to deliver one or more of the following outputs

- Deliver better understanding of the links between morphological change and ecological status to enable river basin managers to assess, plan and adapt to these changes.
- Improved monitoring and data analysis techniques for assessing hydrological and morphological changes (both upstream and downstream of the pressure) and provide recommendations for standard methods.
- Deliver techniques to understand and manage the impacts of altered hydrology (flow rates and volumes) on biological elements.
- The development of tools/methodologies to assess the "ecological flow regime" of rivers, based on minimum, maximum and other critical seasonal flows – to allow the acceptable level of hydrological changes to be set by river basin managers.
- Deliver tools that support decision-making and policy development in extreme events (both floods and droughts) relating to water quality.

Applicants submitting proposals to this Call are expected to make themselves familiar with the contents of the EU FP7 projects and previous framework programmes, projects and also the work undertaken by national programmes in this field – (see IWRM website) and other relevant work.

2.2 Water Governance

Integrated Water Resources Management is a complex process involving a large number of issues that must be considered. The European Union has published two Directives, 2000/60/EC and 2006/118/EC, setting out a framework for community action in the field of water policy as a means of implementing Integrated Water Resources Management across Europe. It sets out specific criteria such as the production of river basin management plans (article 13 WFD), the recovery of costs for water services (article 9 WFD) as well as trend assessment concerning pollution of groundwater bodies and necessary reversal strategies (article 5 GWD) that will add to the management plans.

The difficulty in Europe as with many areas around the world is that the issues are not uniform across basins and management must be trans-boundary, which means that management must consider issues across local to international boundaries when dealing with effects. This occurs with both administrative boundaries and physical boundaries and consideration must be made for the interaction and interplay between these.

IWRM-NET is looking to promote research that facilitates delivery of an integrated management system, to help develop common approaches, to coordinate actions and harmonise methodologies. This should involve the participation of all stakeholders and ensure communication is effective between and within administrative bodies across the river basins. Fundamental to this aspect of water management is the idea of conflict minimisation and resolution.

Research bids are invited to deliver one or more of the following outputs

- Providing techniques for the assessment and integration of the full economic costs of water use (including social, environmental and economic issues) and insight into the relationship between price mechanism and consumer behaviour, related to the use of water.
- Investigate methods for integrating full economic costs with governance and sociology to obtain fair and sustainable water management.
- Investigate the right territory for water management in terms inter-connecting the different administrative scales.
- Provide techniques for efficient setting of objectives in trans-boundary basins and methods to evaluate effectiveness in achieving the objectives using a comparison of approaches from a number of countries participating in IWRM-NET.
- Provide techniques to integrate expert judgement, multi-disciplinary scientific knowledge and stakeholders' involvement into the decision-making process and in particular ways to improve the incorporation of social sciences.
- Provide decision-support tools for Integrated Water Resources Management combining multi-disciplinary models.

3. Bodies involved in the 1st IWRM-Net Call

IWRM-NET Joint Call Core Group (hereafter known as the Core Group)

IWRM-NET has established a Core Group formed by representatives of the funding bodies. The Core Group (on behalf of the funding bodies) will be responsible for the decision-making process and the management of the 1st Joint IWRM-NET Call at the national level. Members of the Core Group will:

- Provide a national helpdesk facility to answer questions and resolve problems raised by their national applicants.
- Be responsible for administrative activity on behalf of the Funding Parties in relation to the application (e.g. contract negotiations).
- Monitor and evaluate progress of the funded research projects.

IWRM-NET Call Secretariat

A Call Secretariat has been set up at PTKA (Partner of the IWRM-Net) to assist IWRM-NET and national funding bodies. It will be the primary point of contact between the research consortia and the funding bodies, IWRM-NET and the Scientific Evaluation Board. During the application and evaluation period of proposals, this Call Secretariat will:

- Collect applications and distribute them to the national partners.
- Provide a helpdesk facility to answer questions and resolve problems raised by the research consortia.
- Coordinate and make transparent evaluation and approval processes of applications.
- Mediate contact to evaluators.

The Research Partners shall inform the Call Secretariat and each national funding body for the research project concerned of any event which might affect the implementation of the project.

The Research Partners shall acknowledge IWRM-NET and the individual national funding bodies in any documents that will be produced (in written, oral or electronic) within the research project.

5. Call Funding

5.1 The Funding Mode

For the 1st Joint Call, IWRM-NET will offer grant funding and the 'National Contributions Model', i.e. every country funds its own applicants.

Moreover, IWRM-NET is open towards a flexible mode of 'Project Adoption' if necessary, to ensure highest quality of the Project Consortium and its goals. This means that applicants within a Project Consortium lacking national funding can be supported by a country of another Project Consortium member via subcontracts (if applicable, dependent on the national rules) to enable and fulfil essential contributions to the overall project.

Applicants will be encouraged to bring in third party funding, but this will not preclude the funding of highly ranked proposals which lack such contributions. The grant rate within the Call will thus be variable up to a maximum of 100% depending upon individual funders rules. These rates and additional specific conditions will be provided in the national part of the Call package or communicated otherwise by the national funders. However, every partner of a Project Consortium must provide evidence of suitable financial support to cover their costs, which will not be covered by IWRM-NET.

All IWRM members agreed that within the call we

- allow for subcontracting if required for optimal outcome of the project, and
- will fund personnel, travel expenses and small equipment up to 20.000 €

In case national financial regulations differ from these IWRM-NET rules, the more restrictive rules will apply.

5.2 Final payment conditions

All funding bodies will be able of retaining the final payment for a project (amount based on national funding rules) until:

- a) complete and accepted accounts as well as final transnational reports; and
- b) deliverables have been submitted to, and accepted by the Core Group and the national funding bodies.

6. Call Publication and Advertising

The coordinated Call will be advertised in the Official Journal of the European Union, on the IWRM-NET homepage and other suitable IWRM-related websites, through CORDIS, the Water & Soil Times EU newsletter and in relevant scientific and technical journals in each of the partner countries as well as on relevant websites of the participating countries.

7. Submission and evaluation of Proposals

7.1 Submission Procedure

Proposals shall be submitted according to the terms of the 'Applicants' Guide' until February 28th, 2008. The coordinators of applying project consortia have to send the full proposals in one package electronically to iwrm-net@ptka.fzk.de and with 2 paper hard copies to the Call Secretariat. For reasons of comparability and efficacy a single Common Application Form will be used subdivided into parts 'A' (common part) and 'B' (national). The common part of the proposals has to be in English supporting the evaluation process and further the project ranking.

The applications will be registered and go through a:

- (1) formal check (deadline, fit to formal requirements of the Call, completeness of application documents) by the Call Secretariat
- (2) eligibility test according to the national rules
- (3) scientific evaluation by the scientific review board
- (4) approval/dispute of ranking and final decision by national funding bodies

All proposals submitted shall be treated confidentially by the IWRM-NET partners and their appointed reviewers.

7.2 Evaluation

Eligibility Test

The eligibility test to be conducted by the Call Secretariat will be an administrative procedure that will use the following criteria:

- **Number of participants and their place of establishment**

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Any legal entity eligible to participate in the national RTD programmes of the IWRM-NET partner countries may apply for funding under the IWRM-NET coordinated Call.

Each consortium applying for a project must be trans-national and provide a minimum of 3 partners (legal entities) from different countries. Research teams from countries not covered by the IWRM-NET can participate as partners, given that at least 2 IWRM-NET partner countries are present in the consortium. Expenses for these research teams have to be covered by their own country, third sponsors or provided by an IWRM-NET partner via subcontracting.

- **Compliance with Procedures**

Only proposals which are fully compliant with the procedures outlined in the 'Applicants' Guide' shall be eligible for consideration for funding.

- **Ethics**

Applicants will be asked to sign a declaration as part of the proposal process, that the project does not contravene the European principle of ethics as applied for FP7.

Any proposal which appears to offend against fundamental ethical principles shall not be selected, and may be excluded from the evaluation and selection procedure at any time.

- **Meeting the deadline**

Proposals arriving after the proposed deadline of February 28, 2008 will not enter the evaluation procedure but instead will be sent back to the applicant.

Scientific evaluation

Eligible applications will be sent for further evaluation to the responsible national partners for two 'tests':

- **(I) Funding Evaluation**

This evaluation will happen at the 'individual funders' level. It will confirm that the proposal falls within the funding organisations remit and / or priorities and is therefore capable of being funded in the IWRM-NET Call.

- **(II) 'Fit to Call' Evaluation**

This evaluation will confirm that the proposal makes a significant contribution to the work area described in the Call. The successful proposals are taken forward to the second stage of evaluation, i.e. peer reviewing.

Those proposals which pass the formal requirements will be forwarded to and judged by an independent international scientific review board for assessing the quality of scientific content and ranking (peer review).

In the case that an application of one of the partners of a consortium will not pass the national eligibility test, the Call Secretariat will mediate to find an appropriate solution together with the respective national funders.

Experts will be appointed by the Call Secretariat on behalf of IWRM-NET at the end of 2007. Reviewers are allowed to submit own proposals but will be excluded from evaluating them or related applications. A statement to confirm that they are not facing a conflict of interests is part of the evaluation form.

Proposals will be distributed to the reviewers by the Call Secretariat in a way that

- no expert will have to judge proposals its own institution will be involved in
- proposals from research consortia will be evaluated as a whole
- each reviewer will have an almost equal number of proposal to evaluate

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Peer review will be confidential and based on the criteria given below:

- (1) Added value for the WFD implementation/ IWRM policy and potential for solving problems; 10 CP
- (2) Relevance/ extent to which the proposed project addresses the objectives of the Call; 10 CP
- (3) Scientific quality of the project approach and Innovation (clear progress beyond the current state-of-the-art); 15 CP (minimum 10 CP)
- (4) Inter- and Transdisciplinarity (good diversity of scientific disciplines, complementarity between participants); 4 CP
- (5) Demonstration/ Case studies Are there good practical demonstration examples (case studies) provided; 5 CP
- (6) Dissemination/ Expected exploitability of results; 15 CP
- (7) Trans-national linkage and benefit of cooperation (clear added value) 4 CP
- (8) Quality of consortium management and expertise of the coordinator and the project partners; 15 CP
- (9) Prospects for success with regard to the work and financial plan including time schedule. 10 CP

Each Proposal will be evaluated by 3 evaluators (scientist and practioners). The outcome of all evaluations will be documented in an online Call coordination scheme (restricted access; for IWRM-NET members and funders only) to allow for cross-checking all partners of a Project Consortium. If necessary, a meeting to harmonize differences in evaluation will be organized.

7.3 Application of the Selection Criteria – the Evaluation Model

Each of the criteria above will be subject to evaluation on a defined scale up to 15 Credit Points dependent on importance. To ensure scientific quality of the proposed projects we will set a threshold of 10 out of 15 Credit Points for criterion 3.

Next to the scoring, reviewers may comment each point and/or raise questions in order to clarify matters or improve the concept. The evaluation form has to be returned until April 30, 2008 to allow for feedback from the applicant if required. All comments will be forwarded anonymously to the applicants and answers will be returned to the reviewers. Applications with low scores that will not be funded, will not enter into this exchange with reviewers. Comments and filled evaluation forms will be provided for the national partners for contract negotiations with successful applicants.

After this procedure a ranking list will be set up, that is subject to discussion and final approval by the funding bodies. All applicants will get a formal letter along with the evaluation summary reports once the final ranking list is approved.

The whole review process will be coordinated by the Call Secretariat and comprises:

- The distribution of proposals among the involved people.
- The contact between the peer reviewers and the proposal coordinators to ensure that questions arising from the review process are answered.
- Compilation of reviews and provision of a final ranking list for the IWRM-NET consortium.

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- Organisation of a meeting at May 29/30, 2008 to come to a final funding decision. This meeting will be held in Berlin and will involve the Core Group and engaged funders. Whether reviewers will be invited to this meeting will be decided depending on the outcome of the evaluation process. In case of involvement, reviewers will be paid for their travel expenses by IWRM-NET.
- Notification of applicants about funding decision.

7.4 Final Funding Decision/ Resolution of disputes

The Core Group will meet in Berlin at May 29/30, 2008 to come to a final funding decision based on the scientific advice provided by peer review process. Whether reviewers will be invited to this meeting or not will be decided depending on the outcome of the evaluation process.

The participants of the meeting will aim to create a balanced portfolio of projects in the programme, taking into account scientific excellence, value added for the WFD and the availability and mobility of funding from each IWRM-NET country. The representatives must have sufficient delegated authority to take funding decisions in the moderation meeting. Participants should know whether they might have the opportunity to modify their planned budget or accept, whenever possible, to fund foreign teams, e.g. by means of subcontracts from their national laboratories.

The panel will divide the proposals into one of the following three categories:

- (1) Approved Project
- (2) Reserve list
- (3) Rejected Projects

If disputes remain after the moderation meeting, the issue is elevated to a temporary Conflict Resolution sub Committee (CRCom) like applied for conflict resolution in IWRM-NET. The GA chairman will commission this CRCom to find a compromise; the 3 members of the CRCom will report to the GA to get a formal agreement in case of potential impact on the project. In the unexpected case that the GA cannot find agreement regarding a particular matter, OIEau will solely decide in order to avoid a standstill of the project.

Following the moderation meeting, THE CALL SECRETARIAT will – on behalf of IWRM-NET - send notification letters to the project coordinators to inform them on the outcome of the final funding decision. In the case of successful proposals, this will state that the proposal has been positively evaluated, but that no work should be undertaken until the contract negotiations have been concluded and funding confirmation is received from each identified national funding body. The notification letter will be copied to the relevant national funders who will confirm their contributions as contracts are agreed.

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The evaluation process is pinpointed in the flowchart below:

8. Contractual relationships

Funding Contracts

Each project includes several consortium members called **Research Partners** and one **Research Coordinator**. Each research partner (including the Research Coordinator) will have a separate Funding Contract (or likewise, dependent on the national regulations) with one of the national funding bodies listed above. The contracts will be let in coordinated way such that the projects will be delivered transnationally.

Each Funding Contract for an approved project shall have an identical length of term, which shall be for between 18 and 24 months.

Considering the short duration of projects, changes to the composition of research consortia or in budgets can not occur during the contract. If a partner drops out of a consortium, the problem has to be solved by the consortium in line with its Consortium Agreement. The Core Group must be kept informed of such events.

Any changes in the work plan should only be minor but will need to be authorised by the Core Group before any amendment to the contract by the funding bodies can be issued. The Research Partners shall inform the Call Secretariat and the funding bodies of that project of any event which might affect the implementation of the project.

Research Consortium Agreements

IWRM-NET requires all successful research consortia to enter into Consortium Agreements between themselves, in order to manage the delivery of the project activities, finances, IPR and to avoid disputes which might be detrimental to the completion of the project.

It will be the responsibility of the Research Coordinators to draw up a Consortium Agreement suitable to their own group. The Consortium Agreement will normally be under the law and legal system of the country of the Research Coordinator. The purpose of this document will be:

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- To underpin the researchers collaboration, and provide the researchers with mutual assurance on project management structures and procedures, and their rights and obligations towards one another and;
- To assure the research funders that the consortia have a satisfactory decision making capability and are able to work together in a synergistic manner.

The following subjects (as a minimum) should be addressed by the Consortium Agreement:

- purpose and definitions
- organisation and management of the project:
- coordinator: nomination of the Research Coordinator for the consortium and description of the role of the coordinator;
- research partners: persons in charge, role & key tasks, and conditions for their change; obligations and responsibilities of the research partners;
- deliverables (transnational reports and if relevant requirements for national reports where co-ordination is required);
- resources and funding;
- confidentiality and publishing;
- Intellectual Property Rights (how this will be handled between the partners);
- decision making within the consortium;
- handling of internal disputes;
- the liabilities of the partners towards one another (including the handling of default of contract);
- the role of the Consortium Agreement in accession to the contract.

Commencement of projects

A project can commence as soon as the Call Secretariat has acknowledged receipt of:

- 1) the copies of the signed Funding Contracts of all Research Consortium partners, and
- 2) a copy of the signed Research Consortium 'Consortium agreement'.

Once the contract comes into effect, eligible costs may be claimed according to the national rules. In the interim period, researchers may commence work on the project at their own risk and costs.

9. Progress monitoring and reporting

Participants in IWRM-NET projects will need to fulfil the reporting needs of both individual national funders and IWRM-NET as a whole. As a consequence, two levels of reporting are required:

- Each participant must report progress on its own component of the work to the national funders in line with normal contractual obligations (where required)
- Research Coordinators must additionally report progress on the project as a whole to the IWRM-NET via the Call Secretariat (common Report Form). Project reports must be produced in English, and may be produced in other languages at the researcher's discretion and cost.

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Project specific reporting requirements (including any requirements for interim reports) will be agreed by the funders and the IWRM-NET for each project, and the additional requirements of the Core Group over and above national requirements will be kept to a minimum, commensurate with monitoring the project progress on a transnational basis.

The Research Partners are jointly responsible for delivery of the work, and the Core Group will only accept reports delivered on behalf of the consortium, via the Research Coordinator.

Project outputs and deliverables will be evaluated by the IWRM-NET and the relevant national funding bodies. The project deliverables shall only be deemed approved when the Call Secretariat confirms approval to the Research Coordinator, or (if modifications are required) confirms to the Research Coordinator approval of the modified version of any deliverable.

The IWRM-NET shall have the right to carry out scientific audits on the participants, in order to ensure that the project is being carried out under the conditions claimed and in accordance with the project proposal.

10. Ownership of Knowledge

Results and new Intellectual Property Rights resulting from projects funded through the IWRM-NET First Call will be owned by the researchers.

Where several participants have jointly carried out work generating new Intellectual Property Rights (IPR), they shall agree amongst themselves the allocation of ownership of IPR, taking into account their contributions to the creation of those IPR as well as the Framework on State Aid (http://ec.europa.eu/competition/state_aid/reform/rdi_en.pdf).

The results of the research project and IPR created should be actively exploited and made available for use, whether for commercial gain or not, in order for public benefit to be obtained from the knowledge created. Researchers will be expected to make available either free of charge or for fair and reasonable royalties the Intellectual Property Rights created in the projects.

All IWRM-NET consortium members shall have the right to use documents, information and results submitted by the Research Partners and/ or to use the information and results for their own purposes, provided that the owner's rights are kept and taking care to specify their provenance.

11. Dissemination of Knowledge

A major objective of IWRM-NET is the trans-national delivery of a work programme and knowledge transfer of the common results amongst the participating countries and more widely. The dissemination of project results should generate multiplier effects within Europe. Project proposals should thus contain detailed dissemination plans. Public access to deliverables should be given a high priority by proposers and dissemination activity should be described in project final reports.

Participants in projects funded under the 1st IWRM-NET Call will be expected to proactively promote the knowledge and results arising from the work undertaken.

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Executive summaries (to be provided in the Reporting Form) suitable for web publication will be required as a minimum for dissemination via the IWRM-NET website and WISE-RTD.

IWRM-NET will take further steps to disseminate the knowledge resulting from projects of the Call. The active participation in an IWRM-NET conference in 2010 dedicated to Call results and their dissemination will be obligatory for successful proposers.
